

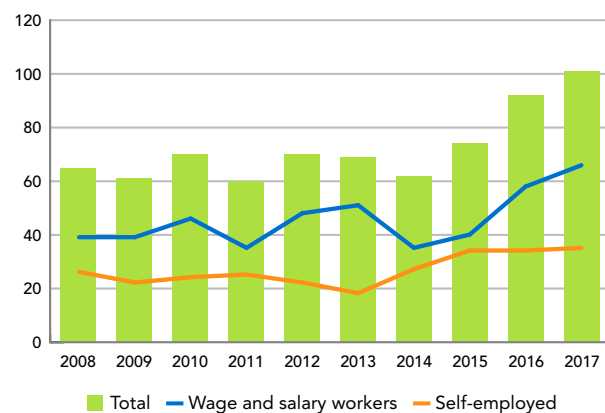
## FATAL OCCUPATIONAL INJURIES

In 2017, one Minnesota worker died every 87 hours (3.6 days).

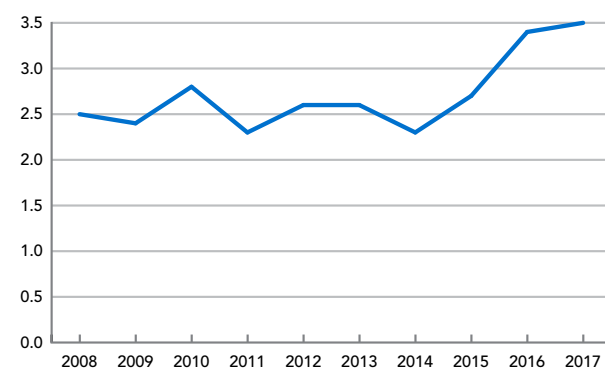
**3.5:** Minnesota's fatal occupational injury rate in 2017.

Almost one in three fatal workplace injuries involved driving a vehicle.

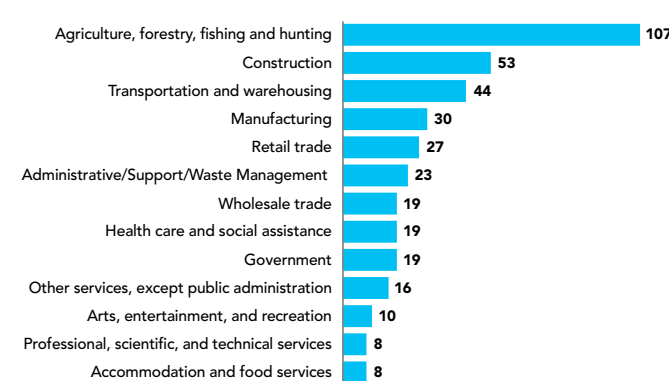
### FATALITIES PER YEAR



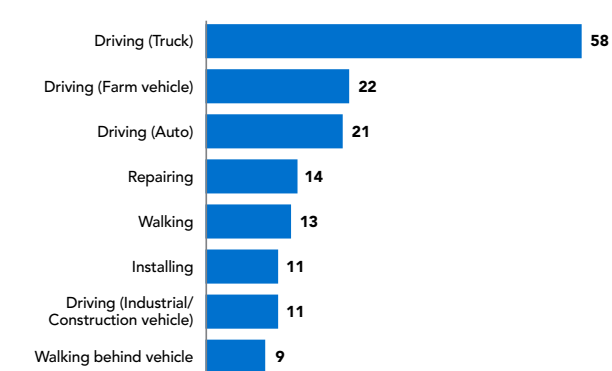
### RATE PER 100,000 FTE WORKERS

### BY WORKER ACTIVITY, 2013-2017

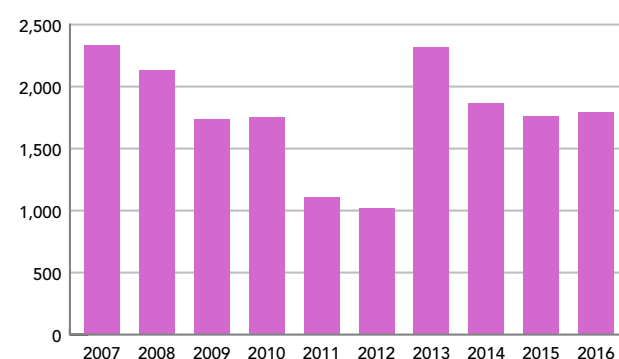


## NON-FATAL INJURIES AND ILLNESSES

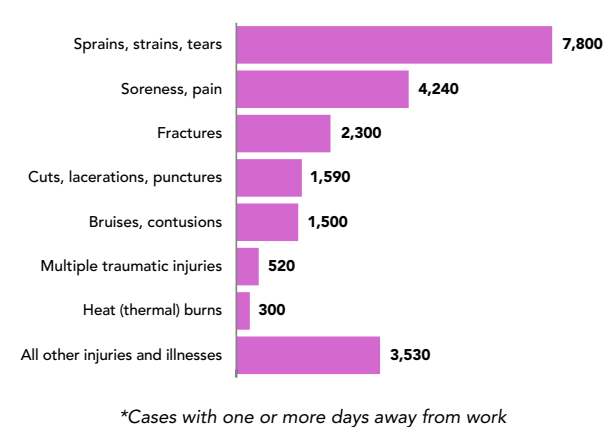
**198/day:** Number of nonfatal workplace injuries and illnesses, 2017.

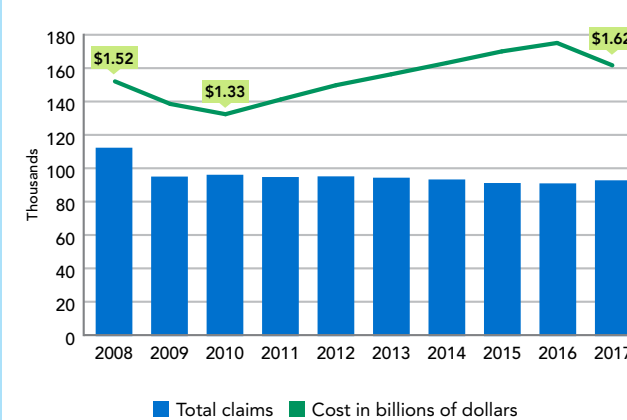
### INJURY AND ILLNESS TYPES, 2017



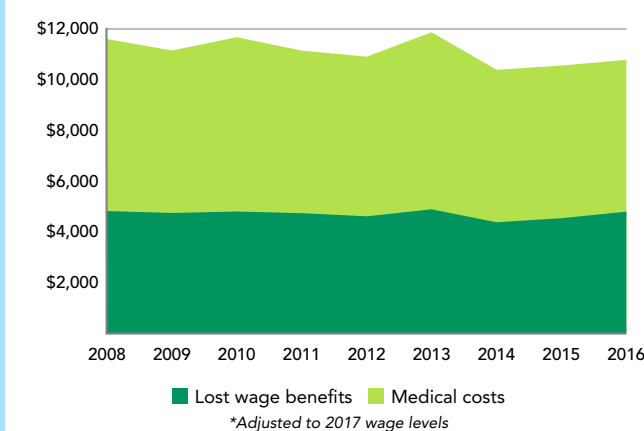
## WORKERS' COMPENSATION

### COST PER CLAIM

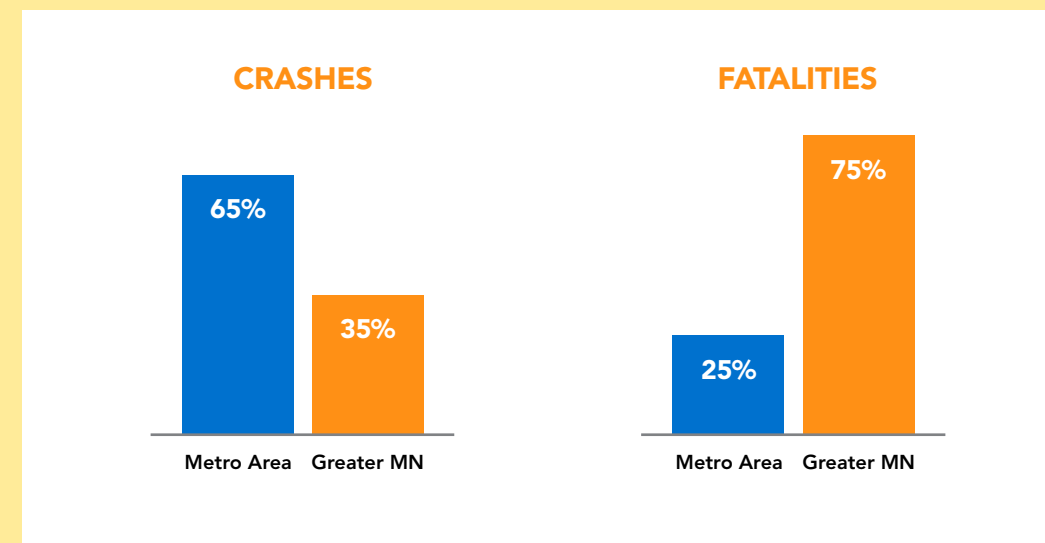


## FARM-RELATED INJURIES

Seven people a day are seriously injured on the farm.

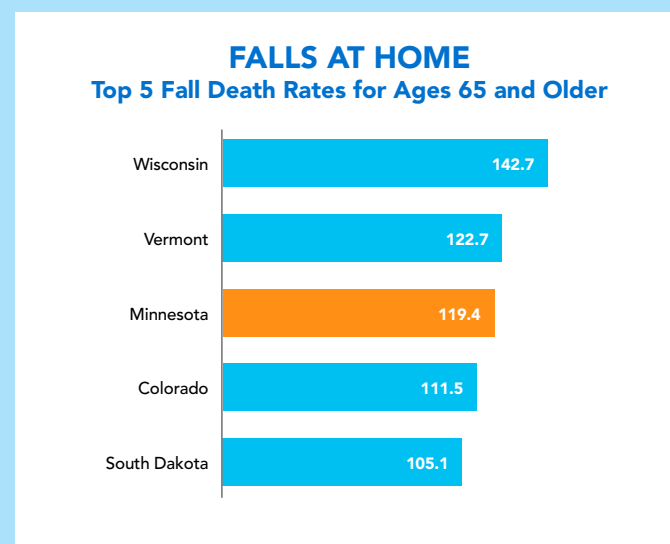
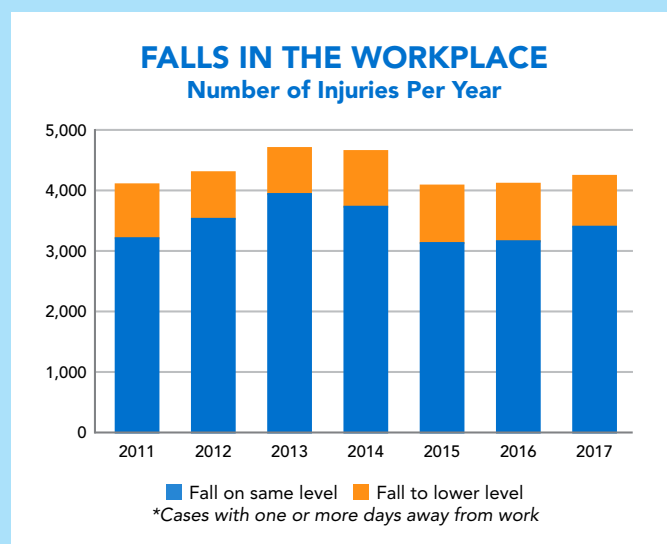


## URBAN VS. RURAL TRAFFIC SAFETY



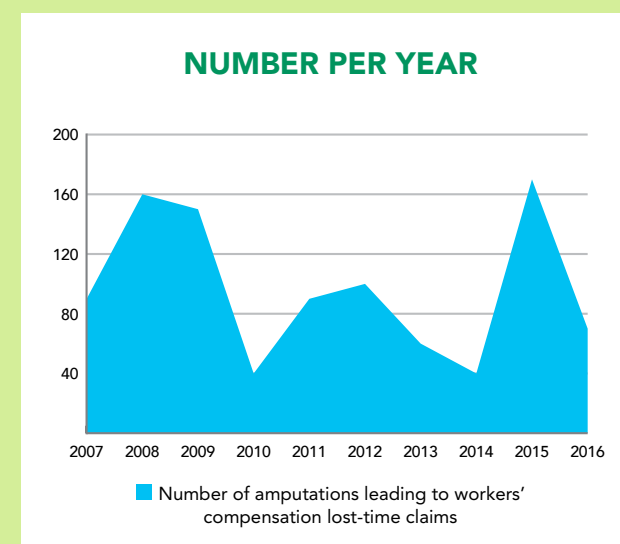
## FALLS

Eleven people a day are injured by falls at work and Minnesota has one of the highest fatality rates for falls at home.



## AMPUTATIONS

Amputations are less frequent than other injuries but have a severe impact on both the employee and employer.



## CONCUSSIONS

Concussion injuries with wage loss payments were 6 times higher in 2018 than 2009.
